BSA finds 3D item about alleged bullying within the New Zealand Fire Service did not breach broadcasting standards

A complaint from the New Zealand Fire Service (NZFS) about a *3D* item which investigated alleged bullying within NZFS has not been upheld by the Broadcasting Standards Authority (BSA). The NZFS complained that the item, broadcast in November 2015, was inaccurate, unfair and lacked balance.

The complaint challenged the accuracy, authenticity and reliability of evidence and sources relied on in the *3D* investigation into bullying within certain volunteer fire brigades. The BSA found that the broadcaster had made reasonable efforts to ensure, overall, that the item was accurate, balanced and fair.

The BSA further found that the broadcaster had provided NZFS with a fair and reasonable opportunity to comment on the allegations of bullying and those responses were fairly represented in the programme. In particular, the NZFS interviewee "came across impressively in his interview and clearly articulated the NZFS's position" the BSA said.

In reaching its decision, the BSA emphasised that it was not its role to determine whether or not bullying was a significant problem within NZFS.

The BSA acknowledged that there were certain facts in dispute between NZFS and the broadcaster. However, it found that *3D* relied on a variety of sources and had a reasonable basis for broadcasting the allegations that it did and also included the response from NZFS to those allegations.

The BSA emphasised that investigative journalism programmes such as *3D* are a vital part of the media and carry high public interest value. Such programmes draw attention to, and inform the public about, legitimate issues.
